ABOUT ST. THOMAS MORE

(1438-1535) Thomas More was educated at Oxford and followed in his father's footsteps and became a lawyer. He married Jane Colt in 1505 and they had four children.

Mentored by Archbishop of Canterbury and Lord Chancellor John Morton, Thomas More had a distinguished career in public service. First elected to Parliament in 1504, he was knighted in 1521 and made King Henry VIII's Under Treasurer of the Exchequer. In 1529 he rose to Lord Chancellor.

More believed King Henry VIII had no jurisdiction over the Church. His rift with Henry VIII led to false accusations against More. His defense included evidence in the form of a letter to Sister Elizabeth Barton wherein he directed her not to interfere in politics. Choosing his principles over death, More was beheaded in 1535. More was canonized as a Saint in 1925 and his feast day is June 22.

St. Thomas More, who stood alone and gave his life for his principles of Separation of Church and State, has been selected as the patron of the Red Mass in Los Angeles.

ABOUT THE RED MASS

The Red Mass is an annual event traditionally held at the opening of the judicial year. Judges and lawyers attend in a body, joined by public officials and law faculty. The Red Mass was first celebrated in Paris in 1245. From the time of Edward I, the Mass was offered in England at Westminster Abbey and received its name from the scarlet robes worn by the Lord High Justices. The first American Red Mass was held in New York City on October 6, 1928 at Old St. Andrew's Church on Duane Street. In Washington D.C., the Red Mass opens the new term of the U.S. Supreme Court each year. The justices join in the celebration at the Cathedral of Saint Matthew the Apostle.

Most Reverend José H. Gomez

Most Rev. José H. Gomez is the Archbishop of Los Angeles, the nation's largest Catholic community. For nearly two decades, Archbishop Gomez has been a voice of compassion and reason on moral and spiritual issues in American public life and culture. He has played a leading role in the Catholic Church's efforts to promote immigration reform and is author of the 2013 book, *Immigration and the Next America: Renewing the Soul of Our Nation.* He served a three -year term as President of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, a post that concluded on November 2022. He was papal appointed to the 2012 Synod of Bishops on the New Evangelization and in 2015 was selected to represent the U.S. Catholic Bishops at the Synod on the Family. He holds a doctorate degree in theology (S.T.D.), as well as undergraduate degrees in accounting, philosophy and theology. He speaks and writes often on issues in the Church and American society. His writings have been published in the Vatican newspaper, *L'Osservatore Romano, The Wall Street Journal, CNN.com, Huffington Post, Vital Speeches of the Day, Notre Dame Journal of Law, Ethics & Public Policy, La Opinion, First Things, The New York Post, National Catholic Register and elsewhere*

Chief Justice Patricia Guerrero

Chief Justice Guerrero joined the California Supreme Court as an associate justice in March 2022 and was sworn in as California's 29th Chief Justice on January 2, 2023, making history as the first Latina to serve as California's Chief Justice.

Prior to being elevated to the Supreme Court, Guerrero was an associate justice at the Fourth District Court of Appeal, Division One since December 2017, and in San Diego Superior Court from 2013 to 2017, where she served as Supervising Judge of the Family Law Division in 2017. Before her appointment to the bench, Guerrero worked as an associate at Latham & Watkins LLP starting in 1997 and was elevated to partner in 2006. She served as an assistant U.S. attorney at the U.S. Attorney's Office, Southern District of California from 2002 to 2003.

Chief Justice Guerrero is the daughter of Mexican immigrants and was born and raised in California's Imperial Valley. She graduated as co-valedictorian in high school and attended University of California, Berkeley. She earned a Juris Doctor degree from Stanford Law School where she received an award for excellence in legal writing.

During her legal career, Chief Justice Guerrero has contributed many hours of volunteer work, including as a member of the Advisory Board of the Immigration Justice Project, which promotes due process and access to justice at all levels of the immigration and appellate court system. She has also assisted clients on a pro bono basis in immigration matters, including asylum applications and protecting vulnerable families by litigating compliance with fair housing laws. Chief Justice Guerrero also adopted the Power of Democracy Civic Learning Initiative and has been active in the "Judges in the Classroom" civics program, which engages schools and encourages students to learn about the role of the judiciary.

Homilist: Rev. Edward J. Siebert, S.J.

Fr. Edward (Eddie) Siebert, S.J. is the Rector of the Jesuit Community at Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles. He is also the Founder and President of Loyola Productions, Inc. (LPI). LPI has built a reputation over 20+ years for telling stories around the globe that inform, inspire, and entertain. Siebert's extensive experience both in secular and Catholic circles includes everything from newsroom stints at WDIV-TV NBC Detroit, WWL-TV CBS New Orleans, to exclusively chronicling Pope Francis in Rome, Philadelphia, and Washington, DC. He started in Los Angeles working on the provocative and critically acclaimed ABC/20th Century Fox television show Nothing Sacred, which won the Peabody Award for excellence in broadcasting. Known to New York Times readers as "The Jesuit in Hollywood," Siebert completed the documentary film Blood of the Martyrs which tells the story of the Jesuits and women murdered in El Salvador in 1989 at the UCA. After lengthy negotiations, he secured the life rights of renowned Vatican exorcist Fr. Gabriele Amorth and executive produced, along with Sony Screen Gems, the 2023 blockbuster feature film The Pope's Exorcist, with Russell Crowe in the starring role. Siebert received an MFA in Film Production from Loyola Marymount University's School of Film and Television, and he also holds master's degrees from the University of San Francisco and the Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley. He is a member of the Producers Guild of America (PGA), the International Documentary Association (IDA), Catholics in Media Associates (CIMA), and is a delegate for the World Catholic Association for Communication (SIGNIS North America). Siebert is a Senior Lecturer for the School of Film and Television at LMU and enjoys helping out at local parishes, especially St. Mark's in Venice and St. Jerome's in Los Angeles. In his spare time, Fr. Eddie takes care of Buster, LMU's therapy dog.

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
